Additional instructions and comments:

Mango, a 5 year old Satin Rabbit, presented on emergency to the Special Species service on 9/3/11 due to a lack of eating combined with abnormal feces for the past 12-15 h. On 9/2/11, Mango exhibited normally eating behavior in the morning and had normal feces during the day, but was not eating by 7:00 pm when fed his food in the evening. In the past these episodes of inappetance resolved when he was massaged and passed stool, however in this case massage and passing feces (feces were

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abnormally small and teardrop shaped) did not resolve his depression or lack of appetite. At 11:00 pm on 9/2/11, he was administered 60 mL of Pedialyte that was diluted with water. At 1:00 am on 9/3/11 when his condition hadn't improved, he was administered 60 mL of a mixture containing Critical Care, Pedialyte, and a freshly-grated apple and was given this combination again at 2:00 am and 4:00 am when his condition did not change. By 8:00 am on 9/3/11 when his lack of inappetance persisted and he stopped moving around, he was brought in to the VMTH on emergency.

On presentation Mango appeared quiet but alert and somewhat depressed according to the owner as he is not usually as amenable to handling. On oral exam Mango's mucous membranes were pink and moist and there was no halitosis or teeth points noted. He had a doughy, somewhat firm and dilated stomach and no feces were produced during the exam. Remainder of physical examination findings were within normal limits.

We have started Mango on supportive therapy for suspected GI stasis. You are taking him home to continue care, and if he is not improving by 3-5 pm, please call him as it may be best for him to spend a night under observation in the Critical Care Unit. We will be in touch to see how he is doing and to update you on the blood work results.

- ☐ We can hear his gastro movement without a stethoscope.

EXAMPLES of Bad

☐ He does not want to be syringed food or water. So we are concerned he might get hurt in his mouth.



No changes from the morning

Mango does not eat and drink by himself.

Mango takes a pee just one time around 2:00 p.m., but we do not sure the amount.

Mango does when he tries to escape from the Bunny Burrito or when he gets massage.

We are thinking what should we do next? Usually our other bunnies show signs of recovery after they get the same kind of treatments like Mango has this time.

He doesn't pee & pool.

This time, he got water underneath of the skin, yet he can't pae. Why?
